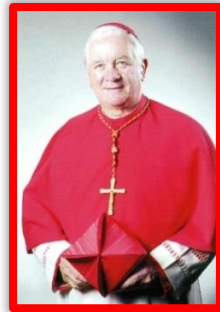


CONTRIBUTORS OF POLISH HERITAGE TO SCIENCE ARTS AND FREEDOM

Cardinal Archbishop Emeritus of Detroit*



Adam Maida was ordained in 1958, he was sent by Bishop Dearden to study in Rome, where he earned a Licentiate of Canon Law in 1960. He received his Juris Doctor from Duquesne University School of Law in 1964; he was admitted to practice law before the bar for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the U.S. Supreme Court. Cardinal Maida served as Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Detroit, Michigan from 1990 to 2009 and was instrumental in establishing the John Paul II Cultural Center in Washington, DC.

He served as associate pastor and pastor of Virginia parishes. Father Majka has received numerous awards and honors for his service as Chaplain and member of Polish-American organizations. He acted as host in 1969 and 1976 for Cardinal Karol Wojtyla during his visits to Washington DC. In 1999, he was awarded the Cavaliers Cross of Merit from the Polish Government. He recently celebrated the Golden Jubilee year of his Ordination to the Priesthood. He was installed by Henryk Cardinal Gulbinowicz as Canon of the Archdiocese of Wroclaw

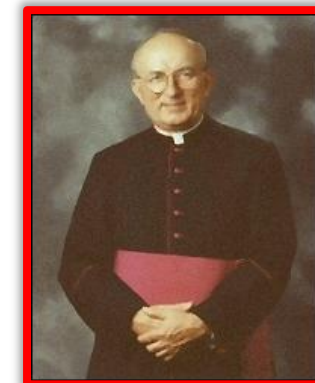

Jesuit Father Mitch Pacwa, works in television and radio ministry at Eternal World Television Network broadcasting several shows through 350 stations. St. Joseph Parish was founded in Webster, MA, in 1887. It is the oldest Polish American community in New England. In 1998, its church was raised to the dignity of a minor basilica by Pope John Paul II. Msgr Czarnecki became Rector in 1993. From 1987 to 1993 Czarnecki, was deputy director for immigration, in charge of Europe, for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.
